t's not a UFO it is a QFO! Quilting for Others will be a community outreach goal of our Ames Quilt Guild this year. We are already gathering orphan blocks, 3 ½ x 12 ½ inch scraps rectangles, and 10 ½ inch squares from which to make quilts for those in need. To keep QFO manageable, the guild will provide opportunities for members to piece together tops from blocks provided, bind quilts already quilted, and tie or machine quilt the tops. Our goal is to make it easy for members to help without the burden falling on just one or two members. The items needing your assistance can be found at the Steve Huffman sound system table with a sign-up sheet as shown below. The Guild has budgeted for the batting, and we have donated backing fabric. If you choose, to participate, you will have opportunities to sign up at each guild meeting and take home one of the QFO projects. We continue to take requests from local organizations who need quilts. Right now, we are providing 60"x 80" quilts to Sleep in Heavenly Peace and the Orphan Grain Train.


Join us for a Tea Party! Thursday, April 27, 2023 6:00-8:30 PM At the Vintage Cooperative

Ames Quilt Guild Member Spotlight Susan Fraser

Hi I am Susan Fraser. I should be a familiar face, as I am usually at the meetings. I have missed a few meetings due to cancer treatments but I'm doing well now. Thanks. I am a semi-retired math teacher. I taught at Central Junior High in Ames, United Community High School in Boone, Valley High School in West Des Moines, and DMACC in Ames, Boone, and Ankeny. I am currently teaching for DMACC at the Hunziker Center in Ames, and I am a math tutor in my spare time. I have two children, Nichol in Wisconsin and Tyler who lives in Texas. I have six grandchildren.

I grew up in Ames and I'm the middle sister of Sharon Boen and Sandy Popelka who are both members of the Ames Quilt Guild. Our mother sewed most of



our clothes, but she never made quilts! Our grandmothers all sewed. Our Grandma Ripley was a seamstress and tailor and I remember when she made a suit for a businessman in Des Moines. I first quilted when I was about 9 or 10. Grandma Ripley would bring a quilt sandwich and a large frame to our house. She would set it up in the dining room and we would hand quilt on hot summer days when it was too hot to go out. Of course, there was no AC in the house, but it was a little cooler inside rather than out in the sunshine. If our stitches were too big, Grandma would pull them out and we would have to do them over again.

I don't think I quilted again until 1976. At Central Junior High, we had "interest classes" we taught outside of the regular curriculum. I offered a quilting class and about 10 students signed up, including Kelly Smay (Irwin now of the QC). During that class, I made my first quilt, which was for my baby due at the end of the school year. It was green gingham with a ruffled edge. I'm so glad the baby was a girl...we didn't know back then.

I worked part time at the Quilting Connection when I retired from teaching full time. One day Marge Fitzgerald and I decided it would be good to have a quilt guild in Ames. We invited people to join us at a meeting and that was the start of the Ames Quilt Guild. We thought we would have about a dozen people come to that first meeting but about 40 showed up!

Why do I quilt? I quilt for the challenge of the technique and the beauty of the finished quilt. I am not a great artist otherwise, so I figure this is my form of art. I especially enjoy trying a new technique or pattern with lots of geometry which taps into my math background. I like to try to figure out a better way to piece the quilt together and I love beautiful fabric.

I am pleased that most of my grandchildren enjoy sewing and appreciate my quilts and

I am married to husband Jim Menzel. We have two married sons, one lives in Ames, and the other one lives in Seattle. We have no grandchildren.

I grew up in Waverly, Iowa, and came to Iowa State for college and stayed. I taught high school for several years, and then stayed home with the babies 'til they went to school; I then worked at Iowa state for 25 years. I grew up without television in a very crafty family, so I learned knitting, crocheting, embroidering, weaving, spinning, sewing and quilting.



The winter I was 10, I cross stitched a kit of pre-printed quilt blocks and sewed them together. My mom and aunts

quilted it. That was the first of many quilts. I enjoy every step of the process.

I quilt for the creative pleasure of it. I've gifted many quilts over the years - wedding quilts, baby quilts, retirement quilts. And many of the rooms in my home have quilts in them - not just on the beds. I also make lots of charity quilts as another outlet for my creations. Over the years, I've done several hundred, mostly for Lutheran World Relief. I take pleasure in making something so useful and needed (and pretty) from scraps and donations and fabrics that some others consider garbage.. A quilting tip to share is perfect your quarter inch seam. Then everything will go together well. Also, *press, press, press.*

TIP CORNER

STAYSTITCH YOUR QUILT TOP FOR A HAPPY RESULT

Staystitch your quilt edge before machine quilting for a happy, flat result. Staystitching is a row of machine stitching done on a single layer of fabric just inside the seam line. Quilt-



ers take advantage of this technique because stay stitching stabilizes the seams along the outer edge of your quilt. What can happen is seams can start to break open as you're working with the quilt and pinning it and basting it and moving it around as you're quilting. Backstitching at every intersection along the outside edge can slow you down and cause extra thread built up. But by stay stitching the quilt top, you can secure all of those seams with one pass. Be sure to stay within that quarter-inch seam allowance so it will be covered up later with the binding. Any fabric, even knits, can benefit from staystitching.

From the Quilting Bookworm

The most common colors for two color quilts are red with white or blue with white. They tend to be dramatic assemblages of large, "straight line" blocks. The patterns in **Two-Color Quilts** by Nancy J. Martin fit this description. This does not mean that they are boring. There is a lot that can be done with squares, strips and triangles. From simple nine patches to elaborate feather stars, Ms. Martin has assembled a fine collection of traditional patterns, although, for some reason, many have been assigned untraditional names. The book also contains a short section on cutting and piecing. The patterns in this book are highly recommended, especially for the beginning quilter, perhaps someone who wants to make their first bed quilt, but not spend years on it. Also, anyone who has a fear of curves will be glad to know that there are none anywhere in this book! One



note, the true beginner, after selecting one of these lovely patterns, will probably be better off looking elsewhere for a more detailed introduction to quilt construction mechanics. This book, like all those I review, is in the guild library.
