Quilting for Others continues to be a community outreach goal of our Ames Quilt Guild. We are already gathering orphan blocks, 3 ½ x 12 ½ inch scraps rectangles, and 10 ½ inch squares from which to make



quilts for those in need. To keep QFO manageable, the guild will provide opportunities for members to piece together tops from blocks provided, bind quilts already quilted, and tie or machine quilt the tops. Our goal is to make it easy for members to help without the burden falling on just one or two members. The items needing your assistance can be found at the Steve Huffman sound system table. We are using the honor system, so take a project home and when finished, please bring it back for show and tell. We continue to take requests from local organizations who need quilts. Right now, we are providing 60"x 80" quilts to Sleep in Heavenly Peace and the Orphan Grain Train.



I owned and operated the His and Hers Styling Salon for 40 years, selling it about 2 ½ years ago. Since then, I've been semiretired. I didn't want to quit cold turkey, but selling the business allowed me to slow down a little (or a lot!). I currently work 3 days a week at Creative Hair Designers.



I started quilting when I decided I wanted to make t-shirt quilts for each of my sons about 15 years ago. I got advice from a quilting friend, dug right in, and made the quilts. By the time I was finished, I was hooked. I took a Quilting 101 class in the beginning, and I've taken several specialty classes since then. You might be surprised, but my favorite part of quilting is sewing on the binding by hand. It's relaxing for me to pick up the quilt and do the hand work.

What I enjoy most is making quilts to give away to family and friends. They are always so appreciative and amazed at the beauty of each quilt. Every time they use the quilt, they will remember who made it. My quilting tip is "Be Patient". One reason I didn't sew earlier in life is that I hated ripping out my mistakes. With quilt making, I learned to get over that quickly!

### President's Corner

### FREE MOTION QUILTING HINT

The <u>open toe quilting foot</u> is used by quilters mainly for free-motion quilting and machine embroidery. The large opening provides wide visibility and freedom of movement. The feed dogs must be lowered. Feed dogs are found under the presser foot in the base of your machine. These teeth work together with the presser foot to move the fabric towards the back of the



machine while the needle and bobbin threads make the stitch line. With the feed dogs lowered, you will have full range of motion without the drag needed when sewing seams. If your machine does not have a lever to lower the feed dogs, punch a hole for the needle in the center of a playing card, recipe card or any firm card stock, then tape that card in position over the feed dogs. For



greater success in free motion quilting, make a small quilt sandwich about pillow size, mark a design on it, and sew. You may want to "put the peddle to the metal" and sew fast to make even stitches. As with all new things, machine quilting this way takes patience, time, and practice.



### From the Quilting Bookworm

Despite the name, *Contemporary Quilting* by Cindy Walter and Stevii Graves is a history book. While it includes patterns and plenty of quilt eye candy, most interesting (at least to me) are the stories about developments in tools, techniques and fabrics in the late 20<sup>th</sup> century. The original rotary cutter didn't rotate. Batiks first arrived in the US in the1960s. The introduction of long-arm, short-arm and home machine quilting changed the batting world. Meanwhile, the arrival of fusible webs, quilting-specific fabric shops and quilt shows expanded the very definition of "quilt". *Contemporary Quilting* is also an excellent resource for individuals looking to extend their technique



vocabularies. Paint fabric. Use adhesives for intricate appliques or realistic quilt portraits. Try freehand curves. Each project introduces and clearly explains a new (at least in 2005) technique. Quilters looking for a book about contemporary or modern quilt design should look elsewhere. Quilters interested in quilt history or expanding their personal technical toolboxes, should check this book out of the Guild library.

# Teaching Sewing in Mississippi

Some of you have been asking about my volunteer work in Mississippi where I teach sewing, so I thought I'd give you an update.

My husband, Chuck, and I made our first trip to Okolona, MS in March of 2016. I've been back 12 times since, with our most recent in April of this year. During our trips, I've hauled fabric and sewing machines that many of you have graciously donated. Because we are still using what has been previously donated, I am not taking any more fabric or sewing machines at this time. (My husband is happy as those donations weighed down and filled our car!)

I teach sewing at Excel, Inc. a non-profit community service organization in Okolona, MS, a town of 2,500 (https://excelcommons.com). The town has a

large, poor population, with many Blacks, a few Hispanics, and the rest Whites. Excel offers tutoring for students and GED, CNA, and other



classes for adults. One room is dedicated as a sewing room, with 7 machine stations. I've taught youth, adults, and adults with special needs. The photos show our finished projects.
