Everything But Cotton—Julia McLeod

International Award-winning Quilt Maker Is AQG January Speaker

Ames Quilt Guild is hosting Julia McLeod at the January 26 meeting. Our speaker will not be here in person, but comes to us via ZOOM™. According to the contract stipulations agreed upon, this meeting is

not one members can enjoy from the comfort of their homes. Rather, the ZOOM™ program can only be viewed at First United Methodist Church.

Julia McLeod is an international awardwinning quilt maker living and working in Northern California, just east of San Francisco. She was born and raised in England, and worked as a textile designer in the woolen and worsted mills of Yorkshire and Scotland before tak-



ing a job with a luxury tailoring company on London's Savile Row. A design position at a menswear company in New York City brought her to the US, and she has been here ever since. McLeod discovered quilt making on travels through the small Amish towns of Pennsylvania. Some of the first quilts she made were for her young children.

Since 2016, McLeod has specialized in making silk quilts, sourcing her fabrics from neckties, clothing and furnishing fabrics. She has a passion for reusing and recycling, which leads her to rescue vintage blocks and textiles. These reclaimed fabrics become the starting point for her quilt designs.

McLeod was featured on *theQuiltShow.com*'s episode #2902, and is on the teaching faculty of Mancuso Show Management's *Quilt Fest* and *Quilt Festival Houston*. She blogs regularly on a collaborative sewing blog, *See How We Sew*.

Her quilt "Viva la Vida" showed in art galleries and museums around the US, and "Dreaming of Margilan" was featured in issue 152 of *Quiltmania™* magazine. McCleod is an active member of San Francisco Quilters Guild and East Bay Heritage Quilters.

Her topic will be "Everything but the Cotton" in which she will explore the world of quilts that were made with what she calls "Not Cottons". She will explain how quilters who don't have access to a stash of quilter's cotton, have an alternative to which they can turn. This one-hour lecture, trunk show and Q & A session shows quilts – antique and modern – made of wool, silk, polyester and more. The trunk show of her own work shows what you can create with neckties, saris, kimonos and other unusual, "not cotton's" textiles.

Please note: There is a change in our usual practice. For this meeting, the speaker will be first at 6:30 pm, followed by a short business meeting, committee reports, and "show and tell".



Ames Quilt Guild Member Spotlight Ina Pour-El

Hi. My name is Ina and, I'm a (mostly) self-taught needle woman. Along the way, I've had a lot of adventures. Thought you'd like to read about a few of them.

I really wanted to learn to sew. My maternal grand-mother, who knew absolutely nothing about sewing, remembered that her best friend, Esther, had been an outstanding seamstress. Unfortunately, Esther now had Parkinson's. No problem. My grandmother and I would do the work and Esther would provide the brains. However, when it came time to cut out the fabric, we turned out to be so incompetent that Esther



took over the shears. My 7-year-old self loved my new, 100% hand-sewn-by-me dress. After all, Esther's jagged cuts were on the inside and didn't show.

When my parents and I first flew half way around the world to visit my father's family, my traditional grandmother was horrified that a that a "big girl of 9" did not know how to stitch. She handed me a small stamped cross stitch cloth, floss, and a needle. It was the first of many happy summer afternoons; me stitching on my starter piece, my cousins embroidering linens for their hope chests. Then came the big gift. It was a full-sized table topper with one corner worked to show me where to place the colors. But, arrogant little me didn't like the colors. So, I replaced the perfectly good yellow and grass green with harvest gold and avocado green. Can you say "Ugly"?

A few months later, I was ready to design. I carefully transferred my (highly derivative) flower pattern to two pillowcases using typing carbon paper from my mother's desk drawer. So-o-o, no one had ever told me about dressmakers' carbon.

My freshman year in college, I decided to start collecting fabric for a scrap quilt. Any fabric would do. Nasty, green polyester satin. I took it. Cotton fabric with a looser weave than burlap. Fine. Four years later, I stitched the (approximately) 1.5 by 2.5 blocks together into long strips. Then I began joining the long strips together. Hey, if one block was a little wider than its facing block (Remember "approximately"?), I just pleated it until they were the same size. By the way, cheap, polyester satin ravels like crazy.

This first "quilt" turned out to be a large sack, pieced fabric on one side and flannel-backed satin on the other. No batting. No quilting. No tying. But warm.

A few years later, I machine-quilted my first whole cloth quilt while living in an apartment that was being remodeled. Note, there is no such thing as sweeping up ALL the sawdust.

More recently, when my son's cat peed on his T shirt quilt, DS bundled it into a leaf bag, for three months! It took a full gallon of Urine Off (2 week-long soaks, laid out on
