What is Orphan Grain Train?

Ames Quilt Guild members have been supporting Orphan Grain Train (OGT) through our love of quilt making as one of our service-related committees. But what is it? OGT is a 501c3 nonprofit Christian volunteer network that shares personal and material resources with needy people in America and around the world. Grain Train volunteers gather donations of quilts, clothing, medical supplies, food, literature, and other aid to meet real needs. The Orphan Grain Train movement is a loving response to a world in need.

One of OGT's goals is to feed starving people the world over. For example, edible pinto beans have been shipped to the schools of Liberia. Those beans are served for lunch to the children, and on those days the attendance goes up; this maybe the only meal the children receive that day. These precious children love to learn, and that learning is much easier when not interrupted with hunger pains.

Across the globe hungry, destitute people live day to day without warm clothing, nourishing food, clean water, shelter or medical care. In 1992, Pastor Ray Wilke saw that need face to face, and determined to make a positive impact on as many people as possible. Today Orphan Grain Train has shipped to 69 different countries meeting the needs of the hopeless.



My hometown is Royal, Nebraska, about 100 miles west of Sioux City Iowa.

I enjoy experiencing "flow" while quilting, being completely absorbed in the process and producing a useful object that will benefit others.

I quilt to honor my grandmother, Mary Montgomery. She was a professional hand quilter in the 1960s and 70s. She taught me hand quilting at the age of 10. I was willed her quilt block patterns, all drawn on bits of paper with instructions in her handwriting.

My stiletto is a very practical tool when piecing. It is useful to keep those seams flat and in the correct direction while stitching.

I own Beth's Sewing and Alterations in Ames. We also repair, repurpose and upcycle garments.


Hints to Stay Cool




According to *The Farmers' Almanac*, if you following these 9 suggestions, you will remain cool during the "Dog Days of Summer".

- 1. Eat these cooling foods: mushrooms, cucumbers, citrus fruit, lettuce, mint, and frozen fruits.
- 2. Stay hydrated by sipping from a large water container all day long. Aim for at least a half-gallon over the course of a day.
- 3. Make a splash by swimming, showering, just wetting your hair, soaking your feet in cool H2O or running cold water over your wrists for 10 seconds.
- 4. Cool the back of your neck because it is the body's main temperature sensor.
- 5. Wear as few clothes as you feel comfortable in, and dress in light-colored, loose-fitting clothes.
- 6. Make yourself a "cool-off cave" in the basement.
- 7. Rub on some peppermint lotions. The menthol will stimulate your nerves making your body think you are cooler than you are.
- 8. Rub a slice of chilled cucumber over your face. The juice will take longer to evaporate than water.
- 9. If you are able, do nothing. Just sit verrrrry still. This is a good time to read in a hammock or sew by hand. Avoid running errands or housework or anything very active during the hottest part of the day. Save these jobs for the early morning or evening.



You may have noticed that from July 3 through August 11, heat can be oppressive, according to a trusted and reliable source, *The Farmers' Almanac*. Besides quilting and sewing in your studio during these hot, sultry days that are not fit for a dog, how do we survive? My quilting area is in the lower level of our home,




which is generally several degrees cooler than the rest of



the sun occupies the same region of the sky as Sirius, the brightest star we can see with our naked eyes in the night sky. Stay cool, be cool, think cool.



A book with the title 10-20-30 Minutes to Quilt is all about super simple, boring quilts, right? Not when the author is the fabulous Nancy Zieman. Yes, Ms Zieman starts by introducing basic tools, cutting, marking, sewing ¼" seams and how to construct strip sets. But then, using only these simple techniques, Ms Zieman makes fleece quilts, and quick panel tops, and elaborate fusible bias curve designs and photo quilts, and even crazy quilts. There are patterns and detailed instructions for large, medium and small projects. Each project is divided into steps, labeled 10, 20, or 30 minutes. This is a great book for the relatively new quilter who wants to work on something more interesting



than endlessly sewing squares into nine patches. As always, Ms Zieman also includes plenty of information and a lot of great tips for the more experienced quilter. With its clear, well-written instructions, interesting projects, and introductions to unusual techniques, this book is Ms Zieman writing at her best. This book can be checked out from the Guild library.

Volunteers received tops needing quilting and finished quilts for binding.

Minutes: Phyllis called for additions or corrections to the minutes. None were raised and the minutes were accepted as submitted.

Treasurer's Report: Will be available at the end of June.

Committee Reports:

- Activities: Stockings for Soldiers are due at the September meeting.
- **Newsletter:** The guild needs someone to compile the newsletter in 2024. Anyone who enjoys this type of creative work is welcome to contact Pam Geringer for more information.
- New Members: New members received quilting biography questionnaires for future newsletters.
- Attendance: 41 total including 3 guests, one visiting from China
- Programs:
 - There will be a Sew-In at the Iowa State Fair where fair-goers are invited to help make quilts for charity. Quilters are needed as volunteers serving 4-hour shifts to help the sewers. Contact Kathy Glatz (kathyglatz1@gmail.com) for sign-up information.
 - Retreat registration forms were sent to members via email. The top half of the form contains retreat details for enrollees to keep and the bottom half contains the registration form. Send completed registration form to Gloria Sampson (solyst@aol,com).
- Nominating: Guild Offices and Committee responsibilities were published in the June newsletter. A slate of officers must be presented at the September meeting and in the October newsletter, with new officers elected at the October meeting. Committee responsibilities were described so members would be aware of opportunities to serve.
