Gift Bags for Youth Shelter Services (YSS) --Sheila Arney and Ramona Tapper

I first heard of YSS from the Ankeny guild when they were collecting quilts for YSS as part of their charity work. In December 2022, I gathered all my unused toiletries from hotels, made gift bags, and donated them to our local YSS in Marshalltown. They were excited to put them under the tree for the kids to pick up. The idea hit me to ask AQG to collect toiletries for the Ames YSS.



In January 2023, Ramona and I asked AQG to collect travel toiletries to donate to the YSS in Ames. As a group, you are very giving and gathered items from hotels in Arizona to Ireland and places in between, from your dentists (toothbrushes, dental floss, and toothpaste) and from the travel section of stores. Someone also donated a few bags out of different holiday fabric. When I finished packing these and bags I made (from extra Christmas fabric – so yay!), I filled 56 bags! Every bag has soap or gel, shampoo, conditioner, hand lotion and one other item such as a toothbrush, deodorant or travel sewing kit. Every item donated was packed up for YSS.

What is Youth Shelter Services? YSS provides emergency shelter for sex trafficked youth ages 12 to 17 in Ames and Mason City and restoration/transitional living services for those ages 18-24 in Ames, Marshalltown, and Des Moines. (AKA Iowa Homeless Youth Centers). YSS identifies vulnerable youth through mobile street outreach, referral, and self-disclosure; YSS assists and ensures that young victims are safe and diverted from further exploitation. The transitional living program duration is up to 24 months and includes housing and services to the clients' children.

To all of you who provided toiletries over this past year, we thank you. It may not make a difference in someone's circumstance, but it will make them smile and know that there are people out there who care and are not trying to hurt them.

TIP CORNER

STAYSTITCH!

Staystitch your quilt edge before machine quilting for a happy, flat

result. Staystitching is a row of machine stitching done on a single layer of fabric just for a happy, flat

inside the seam line. Quilters take advantage of this technique because stay stitching stabilizes the seams along the outer edge of your quilt. What can happen is - seams can start to break open as you're working with the quilt and pinning it and basting it and moving it around as you're quilting. Backstitching at every intersection along the outside edge can slow you down and cause extra thread built up. But by stay stitching the guilt top, you can secure all of those seams with one pass. Be sure to stay within that guarter-inch seam allowance, that way it will be covered up later with the binding. Any fabric, even knits, can benefit from staystitching.

From the Quilting Bookworm

Unlike many machine applique books, *Machine Applique* by Maurine Noble is an excellent introduction to not one, but three different machine applique techniques: fused applique, blind applique and (new to me) upside-down applique. Ms Noble provides complete lists of supplies for each technique, from preferred sewing



machine feet and thread types to the plusses and minuses of a wide range of fusible products. The detailed instructions for the simple but charming practice projects (cats, flowers, hearts butterflies) are clear and easy to follow. This book may be for beginners but Ms Noble has been careful to include information on such scary topics as stitching inside and outside corners or constructing perfectly even bias tape stems. This book is recommended both for individuals new to machine applique and for those who may be interested in expanding their machine applique technique repertoires.

Two members also took additional projects home to work on between meetings. We are brainstorming ways to acquire fabric, backs, and batting for future projects.


Over time we hope to serve several organizations. SHP, Quilts of Valor, Project Linus (Cedar Rapids?), and baby
