Mischelle provides a fully stocked shop with fabric from QT, Moda (Kansas Troubles), Wilmington Prints, Island Batik and more. Christmas fabrics are also among her favorites. Sew Bee It also carries the Accuquilt™ systems, pattern books and a variety of notions. Mischelle loves more traditional quilts and patterns; she restores old quilts and enjoys hand quilting for customers. She also works with customers to give them ideas on how to redecorate their homes with guilts, bed runners, throw pillows, etc. at affordable prices.

Her program for our Guild is entitled, "Triangles on a Roll". Mischelle will show everyone a short, "how to" project from start to finish, using triangles on a roll (paper-piecing) to make a block set for a sample quilt. She will also be vending merchandise from her store that evening.

Mischelle and her husband, Ralph, have 5 kids and 8 grandkids which keeps them very busy. She is very involved with Jewell's Main Street program and does lots of volunteering. ## From the Quilting Bookworm

Decided to go small? Check out *Marvelous Miniatures*, edited by Eleanor Levie, an outstanding guide to beginning miniature

quilters. The first chapter discusses equipment and useful tools. Yay, extra fine point tweezers. It is followed by chapters on selecting fabrics and patterns, how to cut and piece tiny pieces, and instructions for



scaling down larger patterns. And this is before any specific projects are introduced. The projects have been carefully chosen so that each features a different technique such as foundation piecing, English paper piecing or applique. Interspersed "Problem Solver" pages ask and answer common quilting questions. Newbie and experienced quilters alike, should also enjoy the numerous margin "Tips". And of course, there is a chapter devoted to finishing miniatures. Despite being authored by several different creators, all the instructions are clearly written, include excellent photographs, and emphasize best practices for working very small. Got scraps? This book is for you. As always, this book is in the Guild library.

For those living in Ames, the Ames Resource Recovery Plant **DOES NOT** want you to put needles, pins, rotary blades, razor blades, or seam rippers directly into the trash. Why? If the machine jams, workers unjamming it may get cut or poked.



The way to dispose of sewing sharps properly is to put them in a glass jar with a lid and deliver them to the Ames Resource Recovery Plant at 410 E. 2nd Street. You may drive right in and wait by your vehicle for someone to collect them from you. And there is no charge for this.
