Speaker Fee Formulated by AQG Executive Committee

The AQG Executive Committee comprised of officers and committee chairs met prior to the March 24 AQG meeting to determine a set fee for speakers and presenters who do not have an established fee. Each person present wrote a dollar amount on a slip of paper to indicate what they thought was fair considering the time, resources, and planning that goes into any presentation. Those amounts were averaged; the result was \$145.00, so we rounded it up to \$150 per presentation. If 2 or more people present, the fee is divided among them. Contracts issued to speakers will reflect this decision. If a group or presenter vends their products at the meeting, the fee is then not applied, as they will be earning money from the sale of their products.

Sharon Boen beginning class at the Quilting Connection. After taking the hand quilting class, I began hand quilting using a large hoop. I moved into an apartment a few years ago and that has slowed down my quilt making, but I am looking forward to making the baby quilt.

I grew up in Ames but lived in southern California for 30 years before retiring and returning to my roots. I have a son and a daughter, both married to wonderful spouses, and I have four granddaughters. I am also the older sister of Guild members Susan Fraser and Sandy Popelka.

One of my most unique quilts was for my oldest granddaughter – her mother and dad did not want to know the gender, so they bought "Life is Good" t-shirts that they liked, and I used those to make a baby quilt. My daughter-in-law is not a fu-fu woman, so the sashing was blue – we added a pink ruffle after my granddaughter was born. A challenge was making two quilts at once that were alike yet different and had ladybugs for the theme for twin granddaughters. I found a print in two different color schemes and used both fabrics in each quilt swapping how they were used.

That number does not include the used quilts, blankets, and comforters gathered and delivered to the Orphan Grain Train location in Clemons, lowa. 11 carloads filled with those items as well as new underwear, socks, t-shirts, bedding, towels, diapers, and personal hygiene items were delivered at the end of March. Word spread rapidly through women in the Ames Quilt Guild, Iowa State Women's Club (ISUWC) Block Builders, and the March assembly of ISUWC. Other participating Ames organizations include From the Heart Inc., Jennifer Buttolph, President; churches Bethesda Lutheran, Memorial Lutheran, and First Baptist. Story City churches participating include St. Petri Lutheran Church, and Immanuel Lutheran. One vehicle drove up to our March meeting and was completely filled with donations provided by people living in an Ames apartment complex who just heard about the opportunity from friends. The power of your amazing generosity will make a huge difference in the lives of those who lost their homes, family members, way of life, and who are now refugees in neighboring countries. Our drive for these donations has now ended, but the Clemons, Iowa, unit of Orphan Grain Train, continues to take donations.
