Name Tag Please

You may use anything to help us know who you are at meetings. But we prefer a name tag. If you are like me, I know people by sight, but often cannot quickly say their name. Also, for new or recent AQG members, name tags make all the difference in that person feeling welcome. We want to be inclusive to all quilt makers no matter their skill level. There are many other examples available. Just use your favorite search engine. If you already have an orphan block, just put your name on it with a permanent marker, put a safety pin on the back side, and you have your own personalized name tag. Be sure to put your last name on it as well. There may be more than one person with your same first name.
