Another aspect of quilting that attracts me is interacting with other quilters. They keep me quilting by inspiring me with their work, creativity, generosity, and love. Recently, I started my own longarm quilting business, *Short Story Longarm Quilting*. Through this business I'm really enjoying the opportunity to interact with even more quilters. I love hearing their stories about why they chose a fabric or pattern, learning who the quilt is for, and helping them finish the quilt with the perfect quilting design to express that love to the recipient.

One quilting tip that I can pass along is that pressing and ironing are different things. Learning to be patient and slowly press my seams rather than just quickly running my iron over them has made a big difference in the quality of my quilt tops.


### **Ames Quilt Guild Member Spotlight**

I made my first quilt in 1991 for my first grandchild. I was the only one in a quilting class taught at Joann's when the store was located where the east Hy-Vee is now. It was hand quilted as were the other seven quilts I made for other grandchildren. They were also gifted handmade Christmas ornaments; I stopped doing that when they were 18 years old, as I thought that was enough grandmother ornaments, pillows, and knitted blankets.

I now make baby quilts as they are fast, don't require as much fabric, and I don't get bored. I have learned to enjoy selecting the fabrics for my quilts which was a challenge for me because I thought everything needed to match. Being a math educator at different levels has






