

Quilting for Others continues to be a community outreach goal of our Ames Quilt Guild. We are already gathering orphan blocks, $3 \frac{1}{2} \times 12 \frac{1}{2}$ inch scraps rectangles, and $10 \frac{1}{2}$ inch squares from which to make quilts



for those in need. To keep QFO manageable, the guild will provide opportunities for members to piece together tops from blocks provided, bind quilts already quilted, and tie or machine quilt the tops. Our goal is to make it easy for members to help without the burden falling on just one or two members. The items needing your assistance can be found at the Steve Huffman sound system table. We are using the honor system, so take a project home and when finished, please bring it back for show and tell. We continue to take requests from local organizations who need quilts. Right now, we are providing 60"x 80" quilts to Sleep in Heavenly Peace and the Orphan Grain Train.

Ames Quilt Guild New Member Spotlight Martha Johnson

It was my grandmother who taught me to quilt but textiles are in my genetics. My mother was a superb seamstress, and my sister is a weaver. I started quilting on my own just out of college because I wanted to do something with my hands when I traveled. My early quilts are of hand-appliqued blocks that would easily fit into my satchel and go with me on trips.

I grew up all over the United States except the South. My dad was a pastor, so we moved around quite a bit. I've lived in Connecticut, California, North Dakota, Ohio (college), and back in Connecticut



for grad school. I spent my career as a manager/executive in business and government that took me to Indiana, Massachusetts, New York, and Washington, D.C. In 2020, my husband Steve and I moved here from Annapolis, MD to be closer to our daughter, her husband and our grandson who live in Ames. We also have a son in New York City, so we can get our big city fix when we need it.

I particularly love to return to North Dakota and visit my friends there who are quilters. Often I go in February to participate in their quilting retreat at the nearby Assumption Abbey (Benedictine). The light there is like no other. We quilt, and talk, and laugh the days away...and forget that it's cold and snowy outside.

Recently, I started designing my own quilts after years of doing various intricate patterns. I enjoy color, geometry, and the feel of the fabric. I have worked with silk, but I prefer cotton, and there is nothing better than finding ways to use scraps. Our new home here in Iowa allows me to have a basement studio - with a ping-pong table repurposed for cutting. I have an Etsy shop (https://www.etsy.com/shop/spiritedquilts/) and I am eager to continue posting quilts and patterns, when I can find the time. The picture here shows an Ampersand quilt I designed and made for my brother for a wedding gift. It's called "Ted Ampersand Jennifer"!

My quilting tips for you are to keep your machine oiled and use good thread. There is nothing worse than cheap thread and the mess it makes.

I look forward to meeting new quilting friends, learning from the programs, and seeing all your beautiful quilts at the show and tell.

I am married, a mother of 4 children, grandmother to 3 grandchildren, with another to be born in September of this year. I moved to Ames in 1967, from the Twin Cities in Minnesota, when my father started his own company here in Ames. I went to Fellows Elementary, Central Junior High (Go Whirlwinds!) and graduated Ames High School in 1976. I have been a cosmetologist, stay at home mom, done data entry, went to nursing school and retired from ISU as an RN; I enjoyed my last 12 years of nursing at Student Health, keeping the students healthy and educating them on home care when they weren't feeling well.



I enjoy playing with my dogs; 1 German Shepherd, 2 Golden Doodles, and a 1 giant Schnauzer. Our family enjoyed two decades of historical reenactments, and I will be volunteering, starting in May, at Living History Farms, sharing and teaching those skills to their many visitors.

The first quilt I owned was from my maternal grandmother; she had one of her neighbors make it for my high school graduation. It was a tied quilt, and I used it until it started falling apart; I saved it, and I am hoping to restore it someday. I have sewn since I was in junior high school, and my sewing teacher used to give me speeding tickets for sewing too fast!

I started quilting to hang out with my friends, and the first quilt I made was a rail fence pattern out of Civil War reproduction fabrics; my husband was Civil War reenacting, and I thought it would be a nice present for him. The process of choosing a pattern for someone, picking out the fabrics and seeing their reaction when they receive the quilt is what I enjoy most about quilting. And, it is a good therapy; at first it was frustrating (I second guessed color choices, was irritated when I misread a pattern and wasted fabric or had to rip it out and restart; but now even the mistakes and correcting them are more like lessons in patience (which anyone who knows me well, knows that is not an easy thing for me). I used to rush to finish them, so I could have a finished project. Now, I try to enjoy the process, and retirement allows me the time to do that. I enjoy quilt retreats with friends and am grateful to be able to attend them again; it is so much fun to see everyone's projects, get new ideas, share stories about family, eating and laughing together.

What to do with sewing needles, bent pins, and rotary cutting blades when they are no longer useable to us? That is an important question. Some sewists just throw them in the trash;



but please know, these items are considered hazardous waste because they are still dangerous. They might not be sharp enough to do a good job on your quilting project, but they certainly are sharp enough to cause some unsuspecting person an injury. Please dispose of those items in a plastic container such as an old plastic vitamin bottle or a child proof pill bottle or lidded plastic round sour cream container, the perfect size for used cutting blades. That way you have done your part to keep the world a safer place.



Why a refreat? An opportunity for members to gather to sew, learn, share, relax, laugh and enjoy time together.



From the Quilting Bookworm



In the 1970s two young mothers met at a quilting class. Soon Liz Porter and Marianne Fons were teaching classes, running workshops and producing their own TV show. In 1993, they published the trailblazing *Quilter's Complete* Guide. Arguably the first general reference book for quilters, it covered everything from choosing a pattern to binding. In 2000, they published a revised edition and this is the book in the Ames Quilt Guild library. In addition to essential piecing techniques, it covers machine and hand quilting, machine and hand applique (several methods), Liz's amazing invisible binding join (yes, we all use it now, but she invented it), a lot of cutting and piecing shortcuts,

photo quilts and much, much more. Unfortunately, in the authors' attempt to be comprehensive, they often skip details. The needle-turn applique instructions, for example, are so brief that even an experienced applique person will have difficulties following them. Individuals looking for a detailed "how to" reference book should look elsewhere. What this book does offer is a fascinating glimpse into the quilting world of 20+ years ago (polyester-cotton blend fabrics!). Without Ms Porter and Ms Fons's groundbreaking work, the quilting world, and especially the quilt book would not be what it is today. Check it out.

March 23, 2023

1. Welcome

A. Meeting called to order at 6:30 PM by President Phyllis Schrag

2. Announcements

A. Just a quick reminder that we will continue to accept quilt block donations throughout 2023 for several great causes.

- i. 3.5" X 12" blocks: used to make quilts for Sleep in Heavenly Peace
- ii. 10.5" blocks: used for orphan blocks
- iii. Orphan Grain Train in 2023 we will be collecting specific items that are need by refugees from Ukraine. Each month there will be a different item.
- B. Quilt For Others (QFO's) were passed out. These quilts were bundled with binding and a label, and members who took one will be completing these quilts to later be shared with others as part of the guild's mission of giving.
- C. Our very own Kathy Jones is the Iowa Quilts of Valor State Coordinator. Kathy shared some great insights on the Quilts of Valor process for quilt making and noted there is a website that includes a lot of great information as the rules are specific for these quilts. 3. Old Business

- A. January 2023 minutes were approved with one change noted.
 - i. The February program name spelling of Mischelle Hardy from Sew Bee It quilt shop in Jewell Iowa was corrected.
- B. The Treasurer's Report was approved as it stands in the current AQG newsletter.

4. New Business

A. AQG members discussed interest in a Mall in the Hall. This would be a great opportunity for the guild to offer a fabric sale and utilize those funds to support the mission and goals of the guild moving forward. Many ideas were discussed regarding location, pricing, and overall interest. A request to determine if the guild would move forward with the Mall in the Hall was brought forward by Alice McGary, so moved by Pam Geringer, and seconded by Dorothy Sperry. With approval to move forward, a committee was recommended to spearhead this effort. Members voted and approved of this committee. Committee members were identified and will include Jan Alvestad, Mollie Winton, Char Hulsebus, Deanna Jordan, and Jane Montgomery.

 The committee will meet to determine critical details and report at a future AQG with a status update.

5. Committee Reports

- ii. Membership Spotlight Judy Vance is leading the membership spotlight write-ups. She would love to spotlight you! Judy shared the goal is to have you get her the content and she will write it. Then she will share with you for approval before it would be included in the AQG newsletter.
