

I started quilting in 2019. My friend Janet Lehman said I should think about joining the quilting retreats that were held monthly and lasted three days. So, I did. The first quilt that I actually finished was one that my mother and grandmother started some 70 years ago. They had several Sun Bonnet Sue blocks completed. I chose fabrics to go with them and sewed them together to make a king size quilt. I had someone in Arizona do the quilting part. My



second quilt was one that I had won from a shop hop. It was just a lap quilt made with valentine fabrics. I quilted it myself using stitch in the ditch. My third quilt was called "Nebula". It was queen size and Phyllis Schrag did the quilting. I just finished the "Fantasy" quilt and it was by far the hardest one.

I find that quilting is fun and relaxing. Quilting gives me a chance to do something creative. The out-of-town retreats are a chance to get away and sometimes meet new friends. I would eventually like to try free motion quilting. I also belong to a three-day-a-month machine embroidery retreat.

My quilting tip is to choose something that you really like, be it for beginners or more advanced, in order to learn new techniques and challenge yourself. Then, the key is to stick with it and don't give up.

see? Each one as interesting and clever as the last. That, together with our show and tell of quilts for Sleep in Heavenly Peace made me tear up with



From the Quilting Bookworm

In the introduction to *Journey of An Art Quilter*, Barbara Olson states that her goal is to share her personal journey from quilting beginner to professional art quilter and to help



other quilters do the same. Unfortunately, her guided exercises that are supposed to foster creativity, do exactly the opposite. Ms Olson tells people they should meditate. But not everyone is suited for meditation. Next, Ms Olson tells readers to figure out their personal working preferences (from center out, side to side, outside in) by working through a set of detailed exercises (grid 6 pieces of paper each in a different specific pattern, etc.) that are anything but inspirational. Other lessons are painfully obvious. Practice drawing, especially curves. Audition fabrics. Worst of all is when Ms Olson ignores the individuality of the reader by pre-

senting her personal biases as facts (draw spirals using Ms Olson's method because the standard, mathematically-based method does not work for her). This book would be excellent for a person whose brain works like Ms Olson's, but I would guess that most people's don't. Far from being encouraging to continue experimentation, the reader of this book is likely to be artistically stifled.

This book is not recommended and is only reviewed here because I do not want someone to check it out of the guild library and then feel that, because they do not feel or work the way Ms Olson does, they are incapable of innovation or originality. You can do it!

Quilt Making Guidelines for SHP

This sample planning guide is just that, a guide to help you prepare for making and donating quilts.

Quilt Requirements

- Size between 50" to 60" wide and 75" to 90" long.
- Simple quilt designs.
- Colors that appeal to kids and young adults from 7 to 17 years of age.
- No religious or holiday themed fabrics.
- Quilted. Simple allover quilting is recommended.
- Machine bound is preferred.
- No buttons or glued on embellishments.
